BABY HANNAH ARRIVES!!! from Susan Richman

We're so happy to announce the birth of our fourth child, Hannah Augusta Richman! She was born on Friday, August 21, 1987, just before noon, welcomed in by her whole family at BirthPlace, a wonderful new out of hospital birthing center located in PGH. She measured in at 8 pounds 2 ounces and 19 inches long, and is just perfect in every way. She is asleep in her sling pouch baby carrier now as I'm typing this, very contented. We've been getting plenty of rest, and are feeling a bit more energetic every day.

Hannah was actually written up extensively in our "Educational Plan" submitted to the school district this summer-- she is an official part of our "Health" curriculum! And the kids have indeed learned anew all about prenatal care, midwives, labor and birth, and newborns. Jacob and Molly and Jesse are all learning how to hold Hannah and carry

her about happily, marveling over her curling long toes and alert eyes, laughing to imagine what she thinks of the changes of this last week. I hope we can continue to view her as more of an inspiration to our work this year than a distraction! We are even considering a new family book for us all to work on, called "The Babies of Richman Farm", sharing about Hannah (and all the other babies we've had-- the kittens, the goat babies, Jesse and Jacob and Molly as babies....)

I pointed out to the kids that Hannah's name is a "palindrome", that it reads the same forwards and backwards, and now we're playing around and noticing more words in our language that follow this pattern-- so we're having baby-inspired language arts and spelling fun!

The kids have really learned to pull together as a family to help each other out since Hannah's birth. Molly is learning to let her older brothers help her find clothes in the morning (and she's becoming more expert at dressing herself, too). Jesse has taken over the laundry completely, and Jacob has been doing all the dishes (albeit with lots of paper plates and cups to make things easier!), and they are all helping with clean-up chores more regularly and more cooperatively-- they can feel really needed. I'd thought it would be necessary to hire someone to help with housework for a bit, but the family has really pulled through and shown me just how responsible they now are. What a good feeling!

Do keep us informed about policies of your local school district. It is especially helpful for us to have on file copies of local policies-- do send these on.

The picture with school districts is the usual mixed bag of good and bad news. A new superintendent can make all the difference in the world-- for good OR bad. Some districts that had formerly been VERY uncooperative are now dealing in a friendly and supportive manner with families (see Peggy Smeltzer's letter about the SPRING COVE district), BUT at least one district, BLACKHAWK, is trying to change from an excellent policy to one of the most coercive in the state-- weekly monitoring of progress, charging for textbooks, strict requirements for tutor qualifications, unannounced home visits, and much more. So do not ever feel you are completely "safe" when a district gives you approval-- since under current law the local superintendent has unlimited power to call the shots, a change in "command" can indeed pull the rug out from under you. A positive change in the PA School Code will be the only way to insure fair treatment of everyone.
